## REMEMBRANCE IS A CALL TO ACTION

November is the month in which traditionally we as a nation remember those who have given their lives in conflict. It is also the time in the Church's year when we remember the lives of the Saints and give thanks for the lives of the departed. Poppies are sold to raise funds for the British Legion, services are held, marches take place. Thereafter the banners are furled and life proceeds as normal.

Have we missed the purpose of Remembrance? In 1915, John McCrae, a Canadian doctor, wrote the famous poem "In Flanders Field"

In Flanders fields, the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky

The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, in Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow in Flanders fields.

We are asked not only to acknowledge the sacrifice that was made but to act upon it so that those who died did not die in vain. Sadly, the First World War has been followed by a second and many conflicts thereafter. The imperative of peace and our responsibility to bring it about rests as heavy upon our shoulders now as it was in 1915.

For Christians, Remembrance is not just for November but throughout the year and indeed every week. Central to our worship and community life is the Eucharist, which reflects the Lord's supper with his disciples before he was betrayed and led to his death. In Luke 22:14-23, Jesus indicated his desire to eat the Passover with his disciples before he was to suffer. He gave them the cup to share and then declared,





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"I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes". He broke the bread and gave it to them saying "This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me" In that meal Jesus was expressing his solidarity with and support of his disciples and also indicating that through his sacrifice a new world order or kingdom would come into being. He expresses the solidarity with those who walk with him and the commitment to bring about change. Small wonder that the Eucharist remains for Christians the lynch pin of our life together and of our commitment with Christ to change the future.

Understanding remembrance is key. "Anamnesis" is a Greek word expressing memorial, commemoration and remembrance. It is not a passive expression signifying that a person or deed is past and absent but quite the reverse. It is an objective act in which the person or event commemorated is actually made present, brought into the realm of the here and now.

In the Eucharist we are present with Christ as were the disciples and express solidarity with him and with our fellow Christians. We pledge ourselves to bringing in the Kingdom, a process already started through the incarnation and sacrifice of Christ.

In the "invocation" of the Eucharist we seek the blessing of the Holy Spirit upon the elements of the meal and to strengthen us together and in God's purposes. Remembrance is our call to action.

#### Driving an Ambulance to the Ukraine

Alastair Grant writes about his drive to the Ukraine.

In November last year I was asked by another veteran if I would like to be his co- driver to take an ambulance filled with medical supplies to Ukraine. I quickly learnt that an organisation called Medical Life-Lines Ukraine (MLLU) sends a convoy of ambulances every two months. The next step was an interview in Putney with Gerry Strahan. It seemed I passed muster but I still wasn't sure. Would I be insured as an octogenarian? Answer, yes! I realised that MLLU runs an extremely well organised operation. Each pair of drivers had to raise £15,000 to pay for the ambulance and the journey so my share was £7,500. Day by day donations started to come in. By the time we set off in September generous donors had given me something approaching £20,000.

Our team leader in the first ambulance was Mike, an ex-fireman who had led many convoys and previously taken fire engines to Ukraine. He was amusing and caring and we all quickly respected him. In the last ambulance was Mark, another ex-fireman and vehicle mechanic. He was rather more restrained but with much humour, so he too was greatly appreciated. He checked our vehicles every night and had his finger on the pulse. It was made crystal clear that we were under no pressure to go beyond the Polish border and that going into Ukraine was at our own risk.

The week before setting off, Mike sent us a series of briefings on WhatsApp. I was lined up with Lottie Martin and we were to be Ambulance No 2. I was asked to pick her up in Epsom at 0500 in the morning. I went early to bed but sleep did not come easily. I was up at 0400 on a horrible wet night and off to find Lottie waiting in the street outside her house. The adventure began. Lottie and I had not met before. She was keen to take part despite being a mother of two young children. We agreed that we were equals and that we would not hesitate to be frank if we felt the other partner was driving badly, losing focus, or becoming drowsy. It worked well throughout. She was an excellent driver.

The whole convoy met for the first time in a petrol station outside Folkestone for a comprehensive briefing. We then lined up with our vehicle snug behind our leader. As our vehicle was similar to others we memorised our registration number. The last three letters were VND, so we nicknamed her 'Very Naughty Diva'. At this stage we were all largely strangers to each other. We would be driving for about nine hours a day for three days.

We would be stopping at about three-hour intervals and only for short periods. Motorola radios were handed out and tested. They were essential throughout the trip. We drove gingerly onto the open flat cars of the Tunnel shuttle.

The first day's journey was to Soest in Germany. It was the hardest day. Most of us were dog-tired after an early start and traffic jams around Antwerp seemed endless. Our German hotel was fine. A hearty supper was provided. I don't want to see another Wiener Schnitzel for a long time but have no complaints about German beer.

We were up at 0600 for an 0700 start. It was a longer drive, but we were getting used to three-hour segments. Avoiding caffeine – both tea and coffee – was essential for me, otherwise I would have to use the bottle! Lottie was not fazed by this, but it was not needed.

The second night was spent in Wroclaw in another nice hotel but with an even earlier start next day. We were in our stride now and enjoyed convoy manoeuvres. Cars and trucks would insert themselves into our eight-car convoy, splitting it up, so Mike developed a procedure. '8, please move out.', then in succession 7.6.5.4.3.2 would move into the fast lane blocking all traffic but ensuring the integrity of our pack. Once there we moved back into the slow lane. Co-drivers played an important role watching the rear mirrors carefully.

We had been warned that crossing the borders would take time. As we arrived, we could see a huge line of trucks. It took us two hours to exit Poland and we then had another three-hour wait for our credentials to be checked again in Ukraine. As time passed there was a need to find a loo. There was only one entrance to a male loo, guarded by a woman in a tiny booth. One of the team had some Ukrainian. We stumbled down dank stairs to a rather unpleasant area where none of the urinals were working and there were just three stalls. There was no female loo so we escorted Lottie, who as usual was unfazed.

Back on the road we were asked to keep in a tight formation. This worked well until we encountered pothole land – potholes so enormous that we often had to cross over the road in the face of oncoming traffic. At last we reached Lviv to find the Ukrainians waiting for us. Handover took a little time as Mark had to brief each set of drivers with Natalia, a consultant from Kingston Hospital, acting as interpreter.



I met one of the drivers who was to take our vehicle to Kharkiv. He had no English, but we hugged each other. It was an emotional moment. Later, we went off to a grand dinner with a number of Ukrainians joining us.

The next morning, we walked into the city centre for a tour by a Ukrainian guide. She gave us an excellent lecture on the history of Lviv which had originally been a Polish city.

Whilst walking along we heard the sirens going off and loudspeakers booming away but nobody took any notice! We arrived at a cathedral and saw an honour guard awaiting the cortege of a dead comrade. Shortly after that we saw placards up with pictures and biographies of men who had been killed the previous week.

Once in the cathedral, we saw rows of placards with the picture of those killed in the past ten years. It was heartbreaking, but worse still were pictures of loving boys and girls with messages posted about how they missed their fathers. Tears came all too easily. We all know how much the Ukrainians (and Russians) have suffered but seeing it close up was truly awful.

Later that day many of us departed for Poland using Bolt. All went smoothly and we were across the border in ten minutes. Then we took a train ride to Krakow and flew home the next day by EasyJet.
